CILEx Law School Specialist Course in Disclosure



This course is designed for Disclosure and Investigation Officers. It is also highly relevant for Evidence Assessors and Decision Makers and staff in criminal justice units and prosecutorial agencies involved in considering material in criminal investigations.



What is the course syllabus?

The course will focus on the role of the Disclosure or Investigation Officer in order to ensure full compliance with disclosure requirements under CPIA legislation. The chapter headings and key aims are listed overleaf.

How difficult is the course?

The course is set at approximately A level standard. This is the same level as the well-established Certificate in Criminal Justice Administration which we offer for police staff.

How is the course delivered?

The course is delivered by distance learning. Students receive a CILEx Law School course manual written specially for the Disclosure course, three assignments and a student handbook including administrative information.

Students are also given a password to the course-specific Student Area on the website, where they can access course materials; take and submit their assignments; and pose academic queries to the forum tutor. Telephone support is also available during office hours from CILEx Law School's academic team.

Each assignment is designed to help students not only to work through and understand the various chapters in the course manual, but also to relate their study to their working environment. The first assignment takes the form of an online multiple choice test, which must be taken under supervision. The two remaining assignments require students to submit written answers.

How long is the course?

We recommend a minimum of 60 hours of study. Students have one year within which to submit their assignments, but most students will find that they can complete the course within a six-month period.

How is the course assessed?

Students obtain a mark for their online test and written assignments, and the marks on these contribute to the overall mark for the course. The written assignments are submitted to a tutor for marking and comment, and students receive valuable feedback on their work. Two assignments can be re-submitted once if not passed at the first attempt. CILEx Law School will award a Certificate to students passing all three assignments within the one-year period.
